Descendents of earlyday settlers in Wewoka recently enjoyed their annual cousins' reunion on Sunday, July 3, in Wewoka.

For many years the event has been hosted by a cousin, Zane Smith, and Jim Chadick.

At the reunion there was plenty of time for reminiscing, telling family stories and enjoying old photos which were on display.

One ancestor even further back in this Smith line was Elijah Smith.

He served in the Revolutionary War from New Jersey.

In 1778, immediately after the founding of our nation, he and his wife Hannah Hunt moved to Washington County, Va.

In 1800, Elijah received

a land grant in Whitley County, Ky.

Some of Elijah and Hannah's descendants still live in the area today.

It is from Whitley tury ago.

During the Civil War, Marshall Smith had served with three of his brothers in Co. E, 32na Reg., Kentucky Volunteers Infantry of the Union Army.

Several of Marshall's brothers moved to Indian Territory and had established the Smith General Merchandise store in Wewoka, Holdenville and Tecumseh.

Represented at the Wewoka reunion year were four family lines of the original family of 10 children of Marshall and Patty Smith.

The lines represented were John Speed III, Jacob (Jake), Susan, and Marshall Mattison, II.

older children remained in the Whitley County, Ky. area around Corbin and did not move to Oklahoma with Marshall and Patty in the early 1900's.

At this year's family reunion a special feature was a golden wedding anniversary poster which was displayed naming 33 couples in the Smith line who have celebrated their 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary.

Information was provided on how the 33 couples were related in the Smith family.

One spouse of each couple is a direct descendant of Marshall and

They were married 45 years before Patty died in 1910 and both of them are buried in Oakwood Cemetery in Wewoka.

She was the second person laid to rest at Oakwood.

Their parents, Albert Mamie (Hamp-

ton) Chadick moved to Wewoka from Calvin in the late 1920s and farmed north of Wewoka for many years.
